THE LIFE

HYPNOTIC

A NEW SCOTTSDALE HOME
HAS MESMERIZING VIEWS OF
DESERT, FAIRWAYS, MOUNTAINS
AND A BOBCAT OR TWO.

Julie and Bob Clark came Arizona to live near family. They found the golf life too. "We were ready to retire in Rancho Santa Fe [Calif.]," recalls Bob, "but Julie said, 'Can't we be by the grandchildren?' So, a few years ago, we discovered the golfer's paradise called Desert Mountain in North Scottsdale, which is only 30 minutes from our four grandkids."

The New Jersey natives sited their 5,700-square-foot home on an 1 ½-acre ridge of lush natural desert above the challenging 10th hole at the community's Chiricahua golf course. Their desert contemporary-style home with an open floor plan is the vision of Phoenix architectural designer Bryan Rains and was built by The Phil Nichols Company, Scottsdale. Two other Scottsdale firms, led respectively by Angelica Henry and Claire Ownby, provided different elements of the cohesive interior design.

The two-level custom home has a three-car garage and four en suite bedrooms, including two in the second-floor guest quarters, which are decorated with mementos of the Clarks' travels. Throughout, expansive window walls showcase the surrounding Sonoran Desert. Bobcats, coyotes,

jack rabbits and mule deer regularly peek in to see what the Clarks are doing. Each window frames a desert or golf course vignette—a collaborative effort of Rains, Nichols and the owners to ensure that the home robustly celebrates the world's most ecologically diverse desert.

"Luckily, the panoramic views from the lot allowed us to maximize the possibilities and provide each window with expansive vistas or golf course landscapes," explains Rains. "Due to its translucent nature, this residence wants to pull the surrounding area into the house and blur the lines of what is indoor and outdoor living." Toward the south, corner window walls slide open in the great room to connect it to the patio and infinity-edge pool, which reflects views of Lone Mountain in the distance. The master bedroom and its patio have fairway views, while other windows focus views on local landmarks.

The construction team's major challenge was ensuring that these specialized windows and doors were installed correctly. "Traditional-style homes simply do not have the same exacting tolerances and finishing details as contemporary homes," Nichols explains, "so these modern homes require more preplanning and supervision at the execution of the work." Construction details included aligning the 24-by-24-inch interior porcelain floor tiles with the same-size sandstone tiles on the walls of the foyer and, in the great room, above the see-through fireplace



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with its dramatic floating chimney. The porcelain tiles continue out on the same alignment to the pool area.

While Henry and Ownby didn't work together, everything they did works together. Ownby programed elements such as the warm neutral palette the Clarks requested to highlight built-ins such as the glassenclosed wine cellar in the dining room. She also helped design the various ceiling soffits, fireplace-wall designs and cabinetry, and specified such elements as plumbing fixtures and countertops.

As part of her scope, Henry continued Ownby's simple approach, adding textures and color, lighting fixtures, carpets and custom furnishings, such as the great-room sofa and the glass-topped kitchen table. Henry also helped select artworks, including three contrasting paintings by Scottsdale's Charles Pabst and his children, Michael Pabst and Cara Pabst Moran.

"The furnishings and artwork kept an open feel and create a great sense of continuity with the architectural details and built-ins," says Henry, who took a cue from the home's materials and integrated them into the furniture—such as using the same onyx found in the bar top for the tops of two tables across from it.

The home's interior design, location, colorful artworks and desert-embracing architecture coalesce as a showpiece of contemporary Southwest living. "The Clark home," says Rains, "is a harmony of site and structure." ■
